

History in the making: The Art Gallery of Hamilton celebrates Canadian Impressionist Helen McNicoll with remarkable exhibition

Rarely seen works to be featured in Helen McNicoll: An Impressionist Journey

In 1925, the Art Association of Montreal held a memorial exhibition celebrating the life and work of Canadian painter Helen McNicoll. Featuring over 120 pieces, this major exhibition showcased the full breadth of her artistic practice. Now, a century later, the Art Gallery of Hamilton proudly presents *Helen McNicoll: An Impressionist Journey*, on view from February 15 to May 25, 2025.

This must-see exhibition is an opportunity for Ontario audiences to experience the most comprehensive solo exhibition of her work since 1925. More than 60 works are featured, many of which were recently rediscovered and presented for the first time in decades at the Musée national des beaux-arts du Québec (MNBAQ). *Helen McNicoll: An Impressionist Journey* is unique in that nearly half of the works included are drawn from the Pierre Lassonde Private Collection. These works have not been widely showcased until this exhibition, which was originally created and organized by the MNBAQ, and is now presented and adapted by the Art Gallery of Hamilton.

An Impressionist Journey will feature McNicoll's The Bean Harvest – a work that was lost for more than 100 years before being rediscovered and featured on the BBC's Fake or Fortune? television program, where the painting's authenticity was confirmed. This will be the first time The Bean Harvest has been exhibited since 1913.

"We are extremely excited to be opening *Helen McNicoll: An Impressionist Journey* at the AGH so our visitors can explore the life and work of this celebrated artist," says Shelley Falconer, President and CEO at the Art Gallery of Hamilton. "Excitement in the community has been building as we approach the opening of this exhibition, which will prove to be an unforgettable experience for lovers of Helen McNicoll, Impressionism, and Canadian historical art."

Helen McNicoll is one of Canada's most significant historical artists. As an early adopter of Impressionism, she carved an individual and avant-garde path in Canada and abroad, making a name for herself on the world stage. McNicoll's art was widely celebrated during her lifetime. Critics praised the masterful treatment of light in her paintings and the immersive nature of her subjects, and she greatly increased the recognition of Québec and Canadian art on both sides of the Atlantic.

"We invite you to immerse yourself in the spectacular work of Helen McNicoll with *An Impressionist Journey*," says Shelley Falconer. "It provides a rare opportunity to view such a large collection of her work in person – and many of the pieces have rarely been seen before. Representing modernity through her Impressionist style and timeless subjects, McNicoll's paintings invite us to journey alongside the artist. This exhibition explores the outer worlds the artist recreated in pencil and paint throughout her life, as well as the inner worlds she navigated. Examining themes of female independence and fulfillment, personal and professional risk-taking, and friendship, *Helen McNicoll: An Impressionist Journey* gives us a glimpse of the world as Helen McNicoll saw it.

We invite the public to attend the <u>Winter Exhibitions Opening Celebration</u> on Sunday, February 23, 2025 from 2:00 to 4:00 pm, where we'll be celebrating *Helen McNicoll: An Impressionist Journey*. Remarks will begin at 3:00 pm.

Her Too: Contemporaries of Helen McNicoll

Organized as a companion to *Helen McNicoll: An Impressionist Journey*, this exhibition highlights the work of women artists who, like McNicoll, were at the forefront of Canadian art in the early 1900s. Drawn entirely from the Art Gallery of Hamilton's permanent collection, this selection highlights the work of some of Canada's most ambitious modern artists. Among the first generation of professionally-trained artists, they adopted modern styles of painting, bringing new artistic approaches to Canada, including Impressionism and Post-Impressionism.

Her Too: Contemporaries of Helen McNicoll includes works by Harriet Ford, Laura Muntz Lyall, Hannah Rusk Kelly, Florence Carlyle, and Florence McGillivray. They represent the first wave of women artists to travel abroad for study and exhibition and paved the way for future generations. Each of their journeys was as unique as their artistic practice. While all embraced international trends in their work, their paths differed. Some returned to establish careers in Canada, others taught the next generation of artists, and some remained largely abroad.

Notably, many of the artists featured have strong ties to Hamilton and the surrounding region, having been born, lived, or studied here. These include Ottilie Palm Jost, Marion Mattice, Laura Muntz Lyall, Hortense Gordon, and Grace Coombs.

Caroline Shields is Curator, European Art at the AGO, where she has curated the exhibitions *Impressionism in the Age of Industry: Monet, Pissarro and more* (2018), *Steam: Impressionist Painting Across the Atlantic* (2022) and *Cassatt—McNicoll: Impressionists Between Worlds* (2023). She holds a Doctorate in Art History from the University of Maryland with a specialization in late19th-century and early 20th-century European art.

Julie Nash is a curator and art historian who worked at the National Gallery of Canada for many years. Julie played an integral interpretive role in the development of *Helen McNicoll: An Impressionist Journey* with the Musée national des beaux-arts du Québec. In 2024, she was a program consultant for an episode of the BBC's 'Fake or Fortune?' dedicated to Helen McNicoll, which proved that a long-lost canvas had been rediscovered.

About Helen McNicoll

Helen McNicoll was born in Toronto in 1879 and grew up in Montreal. Scarlet fever rendered her deaf when she was two years old and her parents encouraged her to develop her artistic and musical creativity. She began her artistic training in the late 1890s with William Brymner at the Art Association of Montreal, then moved to England on his advice. She settled in London in 1902 and took courses at the Slade School of Fine Art. McNicoll began to exhibit her work at the Art Association in 1906 and received the first Jessie Dow Prize there in 1908. Elected to the Royal Society of British Artists in 1913, then to the Royal Canadian Academy of Arts in 1914, McNicoll died in 1915 at the age of 35 following complications from diabetes.
