Situated on the traditional territories of the Erie, Neutral, Huron-Wendat, Haudenosaunee and Mississaugas, the Art Gallery of Hamilton is one of Canada's longest-running arts organizations and has grown, changed and developed along with the many communities it serves. The Gallery delivers exhibitions accompanied by a range of programs and activities geared to encourage access, promote education, and inspire discussion among increasingly diverse audiences both in the immediate region and beyond. Our current and projected exhibition program foregrounds a diverse representation of art and artists from the region. We encourage global conversations by situating regional practices within broader social, cultural and political discussions.

Funded by RBC, the AGH Educator-in-Residence program provides opportunities for emerging arts practitioners to engage communities of learners in creative activities. Each residency is a six-month project, designed to connect with AGH exhibitions and centered on individualized goals that reflect both the educator's developing practice and the audiences they will engage.

Professional growth opportunities include:

- Training and mentoring in a museum setting
- Experience in arts-based program design and delivery
- Research related to the exhibition and/or themed focus of the residency

We are seeking an Indigenous artist/educator to serve as our Educator-in-Residence. The selected candidate will work closely with the Programs and Learning department to develop and facilitate tours and hands-on art workshops for all ages, with a particular emphasis on school programs. Research and activities will focus on the exhibition Ruth Cuthand: Beads in the Blood.

The AGH welcomes applications from First Nations, Inuit, and Métis artists/educators. We are committed to fostering a respectful, collaborative environment that supports Indigenous-led teaching and knowledge-sharing within the gallery.

We are looking for an emerging Indigenous artist/educator who is passionate about teaching and enjoys working with children and youth. A strong interest in developing tours and activities tailored to different age groups, and in connecting art-making to exhibitions or cultural themes, is central to this residency. Experience teaching beading workshops is considered an asset.

The residency runs from January to June (six months) and requires availability during school hours, with occasional weekend or evening programs. The schedule is flexible, with an expected commitment of approximately 12–16 hours per week, at a rate of \$35.00 per hour. The successful candidate will be required to submit a police check, including a vulnerable sector screening.
